

Tip Sheet for Advisors—Spanish Placement Test, the Language Requirement, and Course Offerings for Fall 2022

Students who place into SPAN 101 (Elementary Spanish I) or who have not studied Spanish in high school:

- If your advisees took Spanish in high school, placed into SPAN 101, and want to fulfill their language requirement with Spanish, they must pursue Spanish through the intermediate level: 101, 102, 111, 112 or 101, 102, 121.
- Students who have not taken Spanish in high school and Horizon students can fulfill the language requirement in Spanish by successfully completing SPAN 101-102.
- SPAN 101 is offered in the fall and SPAN 102 is offered in the spring.

Students who place into SPAN 110 (Accelerated Elementary Spanish):

SPAN 110 is Accelerated Elementary Spanish. It is a course for students who have had some Spanish in high school but who are not quite ready for the intermediate level. 110 condenses all of the elementary year into one semester. If any of your advisees place into this course, they can complete LAN in one of two ways: 110, 111, 112, or 110, 121. The latter option (110, 121) will allow students to complete two years of Spanish in two semesters, but please forewarn your advisees that this combination of classes is not for the faint of heart! Students must earn at least a B in 110 to be eligible to take 121.

We have also given a few students the option of 110 or 111. If you have advisees in this situation, they can decide whether they want to take their first course at the elementary level or the intermediate level (depending on their level of comfort).

SPAN 110 is offered in the fall only this year.

101 or 110: We placed a few students into either 101 or 110. These students did not do well on the placement test, but seemed to have some foundation in the language. We will let them decide whether they want to start from scratch (101) or if they want to start with a thorough review (110).

Students who place into SPAN 111 (Intermediate Spanish I) or 121 (Accelerated Intermediate Spanish):

Some of your advisees may have received a placement test score of “111,” “121,” or “111 or 121.”

- Students who have taken Spanish in high school, have placed into 111, and want to fulfill their language requirement with Spanish, must complete the full-year sequence of intermediate Spanish (111-112). SPAN 111 is offered in the fall and SPAN 112 in the spring.

- SPAN 121 compresses the intermediate sequence into one class. Students who place into 121 and successfully complete the course will have fulfilled the language requirement in one term. SPAN 121 is offered in both the fall and the spring this academic year.
- Students who receive a placement of “111 or 121” can decide whether they want to take the slower route (111-112) or if they want to take the accelerated class (121). Please note that some students may jump at the chance to take 121 in order to finish their requirement in one term. However, we would like to ask you to caution them that 121 is a very fast-paced class. Only students who feel pretty confident about their abilities in the language should choose this option. Their placement tests indicate that they are probably able to handle 121, but once again, these accelerated courses are not for the faint of heart. We especially encourage students who are interested in majoring or minoring in Spanish to take 121 as soon as possible. We will certainly let students know during the first few days of class if they are in over their heads in 121.

Students who place into SPAN 222 (Hispanic Culture Through Artifacts) or SPAN 250 (Hispanic Food and Culture).

- Students who have placed into the 200 level have completed their language requirement, but *please encourage them to continue studying Spanish*. They have obviously worked hard to reach this level of proficiency. With this placement, a student can earn a minor in Spanish with six courses and a major with eight courses.

Students who have received a 4 or 5 on a Spanish Advanced Placement Test:

- While these students have satisfied LAN, we hope you will encourage them to continue with their Spanish studies. They can enroll in either of the 200-level Spanish classes in the fall or spring. Students who have this level of placement through an Advanced Placement exam are strong candidates for a minor or major in Spanish at Hollins.

Please note that all students who took Spanish in high school must take the Spanish placement test prior to beginning their first semester. Even if your advisees do not think they will continue with Spanish at Hollins, they still need to take the test. We no longer offer the test to students after their first enrolled semester.
